End of an Era for Lochfyneside Church

A special service was held in Lochfyneside Church in Minard to mark its closure as a place of worship. The church was built for the United Free Church in 1910 and became part of the Church of Scotland following the union of 1929. The church was erected by Messrs. Speirs of Glasgow who built about 75 similar corrugated-iron places of worship for the United Free Church.


At the service there was a large congregation of people who had had connections with the church over the years, including Roddy and Elma Munro, who had got married there forty eight years ago, and David and Rosemary Fife-Jackson, now living in Australia, who had served as elder and Sunday School teacher.

The service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Roderick Campbell and the sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Roddy MacLeod, who had conducted services in Lochfyneside Church between 1985 and 2011. The church choir also took part in the service.

Following the service, there was tea and an opportunity for reminiscing and fellowship in Minard Village Hall.

Some of the furnishings from Minard church continue to be used. The communion table and baptismal font are located in Lochgair church. It is hoped that the pulpit, made from an ash tree from Crarae, and the stained glass window by Sax Shaw, will also be relocated.









The Commonwealth War Graves Commission have erected a headstone on the grave of Private Hugh McArthur Munro. Hugh, whose name is on the Furnace War Memorial, died in January 1919 and was buried in the family plot in Kileven He was 32 years of age. Cemetery. Inveraray Royal British Legion hope to have a service at the graveside.

JAPANESE KNOTWEED

Over the past few years, you may have noticed that Japanese Knotweed seems to be taking over Argyll. Lack of early measures by landowners to control its growth coupled with climate change, which is creating even more favourable conditions has seen it spread to an alarming rate. Worryingly for property owners, many mortgage companies are now refusing mortgages on properties with knotweed growing within 30 feet, devaluing houses and making them difficult to sell. I recently wrote to the Chief Executive of Argyll and Bute Council about Knotweed on nearby Council land around the football pitch, and was gratified when, not only was there a positive response, but Council workers have already been around spraying the area affected.

However, the Council is not responsible for Knotweed generally. It is bylaw up to the landowner to control it. And this could mean you. If you have Knotweed on or near your property, it is important to learn how to treat it. Cutting it down and leaving it on the ground or to compost is helping to spread its growth. If cut (and that is not necessarily the best way to deal with it) it should be sealed in plastic bags and taken to the landfill site where you need to tell the guys working there what it is so that they can dispose of it safely.

ROAD CLOSURE

The A816 Oban – Lochgilphead road will be **closed overnight** 7pm to 6am from Monday 29th August to Friday 2nd September for essential maintenance works. The works will be taking place between Kintraw Farm and Salachary, and will involve planing and resurfacing of the existing road. The diversion route will be via Inveraray and will be adequately signed. Access will be maintained for emergency vehicles, with occasional convoys for other vehicles.
