FASCINATING FURNACE FASCINES

I'd been wondering how to overcome the very muddy steps on the Leacainn Walk leading up from near the main road to the path that runs behind North Craleckan and on to Auchindrain.

I mentioned it to Richard Joynson, who has been doing sterling volunteer work on the walk over the past few years. "What you need is fascines!" he said. To save me reaching for Google, Richard explained that fascines are rolls of timber poles laid over soft ground to stop vehicles getting bogged down. They are used by the military to get tanks over boggy ground and by foresters who lay rows of logs for heavy machinery to drive over.

Richard thought that rolls of wooden fencing bound together with wire could be rolled over the boggy ground and save the Leacainn Walkers from sinking in the mud. Furnace Amenity Association approved the funding and Richard, and his young assistant Norrie McNab (with his trusty quadbike) carried out the work. And what a great job they did.
