#### Sunday Services

## **GRANTS FOR HOME INSULATION FROM ARGYLL & BUTE COUNCIL**

Argyll and Bute Council can help with home insulation through a scheme called the Home Energy Efficiency Programmes for Scotland: Area Based Scheme (HEEPS: ABS) – which utilises Scottish Government funding to install insulation measures such as:

- Internal Wall Insulation
- External Wall Insulation
- **Cavity Wall Insulation**
- Loft Insulation
- Underfloor Insulation

The scheme is eligible for owner occupiers and private rented properties in Council Tax Band A-C (and D with an income of less than £20,000) - and is open throughout ArgvII and Bute. Entry to the scheme is through Home Energy Scotland on 0808 808 2282. The scheme can offer grants of up to £6,500 for flats, £7,000 for terraced properties and £7,500 for detached/semi-detached properties. The council are currently going out to tender for a contractor to deliver the scheme.
